FRIEND OR FOE?

Introducing your dog to another canine.

Unless you live in total isolation, you and your dog will inevitably encounter another dog. Though many dogs are well adjusted socially, it is important to understand that not all dogs are thrilled with the prospect of meeting a newcomer. How he will react will depend on his level of socialization, previous experience with other dogs, the other dog's behavior, the location of the meeting, whether he's on a leash or running free, and whether he's in close proximity to his owner. Many dogs will greet each other with happy wagging tails, a relaxed body posture and perhaps even a lick or two.

Some dogs will present others with a series of challenges, approaching at right angles, body tense, ears erect and tail flagging. The response to the challenge may involve acquiescing, returning the posture or perhaps even escalating the challenge placing a paw on the other's shoulder or growling.

In most cases, one of the two will fold, acknowledging the other's alpha status and often the fun and games will begin. Be aware however, that some dogs can be socially dysfunctional and may not warm-up to what he perceives as an intruder.

How your dog will react to a new friend often depends on where the meeting takes place. Dogs tend to be much more protective of their own turf. You have a much better chance of success if their first encounter takes place in a neutral location.

The best guarantee that your dog will have a happy encounter with a new friend is to understand his personality. Is he sociable or antisocial? Is he aggressive or passive? Knowing in advance can help avoid problems down the road. And remember, just because your dog is friendly that doesn't mean the other one is. Always keep your dog on a leash.

DREAMS OR FANTASY

The reality about dreaming dogs.

Twitching. Smiling. Pedaling or whimpering in his sleep. Could these be signs that your dog is dreaming? The answer of course, is an emphatic Yes.

The reality is that both dogs and humans dream for the same reasons to revitalize the body and mind. And though with their larger brains, humans experience five different states of sleep, dogs are similar in that they share two of the same Rapid Eye Movement (REM) and Slow Wave Sleep or SWS.

What are the differences between the two?

During SWS, the brain waves move at a slower pace and though he appears calm and at rest, this is considered a transitional state of sleep. His muscles are not totally relaxed and he may stir from time to time. This would explain why dogs who appear to be sleeping wake-up instantly at the sound of a potato chip hitting the floor.

In the REM state however, your dog is experiencing full restorative sleep.

Her brain waves are moving at a much livelier pace and her eyes begin rapid eye movement. It is during REM sleep that you may notice her smiling, twitching or perhaps even experiencing the great duck hunt in her mind. This indicates that your dog in all likelihood is dreaming. It has been said that dogs, not unlike humans, who are in the REM sleep state could sleep through a tornado.

Surprisingly though, not all dogs dream. Dreaming seems to occur more often in puppies and in older dogs. Why dogs in their prime dream less is still a mystery to researchers but they theorize it could be traced to the development of the brain stem. Just remember that sleep contributes to both your dog's physical and mental well-being and the old adage, Let sleeping dogs lie are good words of advice to live by.

HEALTH WATCH

Dog allergies are nothing to sneeze at.

Dog allergies are a relatively common malady but fortunately, great strides have been made in the treatment of them. The most common sources of allergies are pollens, flea saliva, grasses, weeds, mold spores and some food ingredients. Once they come in contact with your dog, he'll react by chewing, scratching or licking the area to relieve the symptoms. Repeated licking can cause the skin to become infected and lead to more serious problems.

If you suspect your dog has allergies, the best course of action is to visit your veterinarian. He will conduct a complete exam and ask you questions to rule out obvious causes of skin discomfort such as fleas (which can be controlled) or food allergies. Your vet may suggest skin tests conducted by a specialist to pinpoint the exact cause of allergies. He will then treat the skin infection with antibiotics while determining whether your dog could benefit from a prescription topical spray, antihistamines or perhaps a cortisone shot.

You can do your part too by ensuring your dog's bed and yard areas are free of fleas and also by limiting his outdoor activity during particularly high allergen days.
